John Feierabend

Dr. John Feierabend is considered one of the leading authorities on music and movement development in early childhood. He is a Professor of Music and the Director of Music Education at The Hartt School of the University of Hartford and is a past President of the Organization of American Kodály Educators.

Dr. Feierabend promotes music education through frequent presentations in the United States and abroad. He is the author of more than 70 books, recordings, and DVDs, many

of which served as the inspiration for the award winning PBS children's television series Lomax: The Hound of Music.

Dr. Feierabend has been honored as a Lowell Mason Fellow by the National Association for Music Education (NAfME); named University Educator of the Year by the Connecticut Music Educators Association; received the Outstanding Educator Award from the Organization of American Kodály Educators, the James Bent Award for outstanding achievement in scholarship and creativity from the University of Hartford, and was the first U.S. recipient of the LEGO Prize, an international award given annually to "an individual who has made a distinctive contribution to the betterment of children."

Dr. Feierabend's teaching has provided thousands of teachers and their students with the materials and techniques to help build community through music by evoking enthusiastic participation of all people. To that end his approach strives for all people to become tuneful, beatful and artful through research based and developmentally appropriate pedagogies that use quality literature. In the summer of 2012 a group of dedicated and like-minded educators honored Dr. Feierabend's 40 years of work with the formation of the Feierabend Association for Music Education. Lilla Gabor

Lilla was born in Budapest, Hungary. She graduated from the Franz Liszt Academy of Music summa cum laude, majoring in Choral Conducting and Music Pedagogy, and pursued post-graduate studies at the Philadelphia College of Performing Arts and at Temple University (Philadelphia, USA) in Contemporary Music, Chamber Music, Piano Accompaniment and Choral Conducting. She was recipient of grants from the Hungarian Ministry of Culture for musical research in Italy and Spain.

Lilla Gábor has extensive professional experience as choral conductor and as professor and lecturer in the fields of Choral Conducting, Ear-Training, Music Theory, Music Literature, Chamber Music, Score Reading and Music Pedagogy, both in Hungary and abroad. Her past positions include: Professor at the Zoltán Kodály Pedagogical Institute of Music (Kecskemét, Hungary) for over ten years, Co-Director of International House Budapest - Music Department, Co-Director of Vigadó-Redoute International Music Courses (Budapest, Hungary), Professor at The Kodály Center of America (West Newton, Massachusetts, USA), and Professor at Universität Duisburg (Germany), among others.

She has constantly been in great demand as a frequent guest professor, guest lecturer, choral conductor and adjudicator at universities, conservatories and festivals in Hungary, Canada, United States, France, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Slovakia, Denmark, Italy, Ireland, England, Spain, Belgium, Mexico, Colombia, Brazil, Argentina, Australia and India.

In 2010 Lilla Gábor has been nominated by Capital University (Columbus, Ohio) for Honorary Membership in Phi Beta Delta, the Honor Society for International Scholars, dedicated to recognizing scholarly achievement and excellence in international education.

Since 2006, Lilla Gábor has been Founder and Director of the International Summer Academy of Choral Conducting and Music Pedagogy, an annual event held in Las Palmas de Gran Canaria (Canary Islands, Spain).

Presently, since October 2013 she is guest professor, conductor and researcher for a year at the University of Sao Paulo, Brazil.



Richard Gill

Richard Gill, OAM, is one of Australia's pre-eminent and most admired conductors and is internationally respected as a music educator. He is Founding Music Director and Conductor Emeritus of Victorian Opera and Artistic Director of the Education Program for the Sydney Symphony Orchestra. He has been Artistic Director of OzOpera, Artistic Director and Chief Conductor of the Canberra Symphony Orchestra, and Adviser for the Musica Viva In Schools program.

He has conducted all the major Australian symphony orchestras and youth orchestras, New Zealand Symphony, Sydney Chamber Choir and Sydney Philharmonia Choir. For the Sydney Symphony he has conducted Meet the Music and Family concerts, Discovery concerts with the Sydney Symphony Sinfonia and Sinfonietta concerts. This year Richard's engagements include Director of the National Music Camp for the Australian Youth Orchestra in Canberra, Ears Wide Open (Melbourne Symphony), Sydney Chamber Choir, and the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra.

Richard's extensive operatic repertoire includes The Rake's Progress, Cosi fan tutte, Don Giovanni, The Threepenny Opera, Damnation of Faust, Julius Caesar, Duke Bluebeard's Castle, Ariadne auf Naxos, and Rembrandt's Wife (Victorian Opera); The Love for Three Oranges, Faust, The Eighth Wonder, Lindy, Macbeth, La forza del destino, Rigoletto, Lucia di Lammermoor, Il trovatore, Romeo et Juliette, Fidelio, Turandot, Pearl Fishers, (Opera Australia); The Magic Flute and The Marriage of Figaro (Opera Queensland).

He has held several important posts including Dean of the West Australian Conservatorium of Music, and Director of Chorus at The Australian Opera and has received numerous accolades including the Bernard Heinze Award, Honorary Doctorates from the Edith Cowan University of Western Australia, and the ACU, the Australian Music Centre's award for 'Most Distinguished Contribution to the Presentation of Australian Composition by an Individual', the Australia Council's Don Banks Award and the APRA Art Music Award for Distinguished Services to Australian Music.



Dr Deanna Hoermann

PhD (UNSW), BA (UNE), DSME, L.Mus.A, L.T.C.L., F.A.C.E

Deanna Hoermann has combined a career in music education with educational research and administration. She taught music and languages in secondary schools before being appointed Director of the Developmental Music Research Program that looked at the appropriateness of the Kodály approach to music education for primary schools in

NSW. With her consultancy team she adapted and implemented this music education research program in 200 primary schools in the Western Sydney Region.

Deanna has been engaged as a lecturer and consultant both nationally and internationally. Her research work led to her involvement in curriculum and policy development and preceded her appointment as an Inspector of Schools, Secondary High School Principal, Director of Schools, and Manager of the School Leadership and Executive Learning Unit in the NSW Department of Education. Her senior management & leadership experience has included the implementation of significant educational and systemic changes, strategic planning, and the development, co-ordination and management of programs such as Teacher Assessment Review Schedule, and the design and development of DVDs for the professional development of leaders. These experiences enriched her work as a part-time lecturer with the course "Managing Change in Education and Training" for post-graduate students at the University of Technology, Sydney.

Deanna was a driving force behind the development & establishment of Newtown High School for the Performing Arts. Her doctorate, from the University of New South Wales, *The Dynamics of Implementing a Planned Change in a Public Education System* was based on her work developing Cherrybrook Technology High School.

As a member of an International Steering Committee in the 1970s she played an influential role in the establishment of the International Kodály Society (IKS) and served as the first President for eight years. Recently she was awarded Honorary Membership. In 1973 she founded the Kodály Music Education Institute of Australia (KMEIA).

Her work and achievements have led to her appointment to a number of state and national Boards in the Performing Arts, to the position of Vice-Chair of the Board of the Macquarie Community College until 2010 and to the position of a Director of SydneyLearning Pty Ltd at Sydney University. Deanna has published widely in the area of music education and continues her endeavours to enhance the teaching and learning process through her appointment as Adjunct Senior Lecturer at the University of New England Armidale.



Dr Chris Shepard

In recent years, conductor Chris Shepard has been closely associated with the choral music of Johann Sebastian Bach. He founded the Sydneian Bach Choir and Orchestra in Sydney and was music director of BACH 2010, a project to perform all of Bach's choral cantatas. Under his direction, the ensemble performed over eighty cantatas, as well as the two Passions, B Minor Mass, and Christmas Oratorio.

In addition to the music of J.S. Bach, Chris has conducted many staples of the choralorchestral repertoire, and he has commissioned and premiered a number of new choral works in both Australia and America. Chris serves as Music Director of two of America's

most venerable choral ensembles: the Dessoff Choirs in New York City; and the Worcester Chorus in Worcester, Massachusetts. With the Dessoff Choirs, Chris has prepared the choir for performances at Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center and Radio City Music Hall, including a performance of Ravel's Daphnis and Chloe with the Juilliard Orchestra under the direction of Yannick Nézet-Séguin and a performance of Bach's B Minor Mass with the Orquestra Sinfónica Nacional de Mexico for Carlos Miguel Prieto. Chris has also been a guest conductor at Emmanuel Church in Boston, a church renowned for its four-decade Bach cantata project.

A committed music educator, Chris served as guest Choral Director at the College of the Holy Cross for the 2011-13 school years. Teaching has long been a focus of his career; he lived in Sydney from 1996 to 2008 and served as Director of Music at Sydney Grammar School. Before moving to Sydney, Chris led the choral program at the Taft School in Watertown, Connecticut, and he founded the Litchfield County Children's Choir, which continues to thrive after more than two decades. Since 2004, Chris has been Music Director of the Hotchkiss Summer Portals Chamber Music Program, an intensive chamber music program for advanced young players and singers from around the world. Over the last two decades, Chris has given several presentations for the American Choral Directors Association and has conducted several high school regional festival choirs in New England and New York.

With SBS-TV, Chris presented two documentaries: Bernstein's Chichester Psalms and From Mozart to Morrison with eminent Australian jazz musician James Morrison. The Melbourne Age recommended the Mozart documentary as a "novel, thoughtfully produced hour". In 2000, Chris was chorusmaster with the Sydney Philharmonia Choirs for their performance in the Olympics Opening Ceremony. Throughout his years in Sydney, Chris worked with a wide range of school and community choirs as conductor and clinician.

Chris holds degrees from the Hartt School and the Yale School of Music, where he studied choral conducting with Marguerite Brooks. He researched the performance history of Bach's B Minor Mass in New York City for his PhD in Musicology from the University of Sydney; his dissertation won the American Choral Directors Association's 2012 Julius Herford Prize for outstanding doctoral thesis in choral music.

David Banney

A past winner of the ABC Young Conductor of the Year Award, David Banney enjoys a busy schedule of performing, teaching and composing. David has presented at numerous conferences on the subject of Music Education, including International Kodály Symposia in Brisbane and Kecskemet, and the 2012 AUSTA Conference. David is a lecturer in musicianship, conducting and violin pedagogy for the Australian Kodály Certificate. In 2013

David released a CD, Tigers and Teapots – Songs for Children, a collection of children's songs arranged for choir and orchestra, and this lead to the Tigers and Teapots Project with the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra in May 2014.



James Cuskelly

James Cuskelly completed undergraduate studies in music, geography and psychology at The University of Queensland in 1984, and a Diploma of Education in 1985. The Kodály Certificate from Holy Names College (California) was awarded in 1991, the Master of Music Studies (UQ) in 1997 and the PhD in music education (UQ) in 2007. James has a very broad base in education, having taught in pre-school, primary and secondary classrooms, as well as

12 years' experience as Co-ordinator of Music Education at The University of Queensland.

James is committed to teacher training in music education, and consequently, is frequently asked to lead teacher in-service programs and workshops, and to present as guest lecturer, keynote speaker and clinician at both the national and international levels. He is widely published in music education circles, particularly in the area of music education and meaning. His passion for music, and his ability to enthuse and bring about effective learning in students across all ages or abilities in now firmly internationally recognised. He is Director of the International Summer School Music Program (Brisbane), vice-president of the International Kodály Society, and Musical Director of the Queensland Kodály Choir.

Freelance work includes Tutor for the Australian Boys Choir, Musical Director for Choral Connection, Founding Musical Director for Brisbane Adventist Voices and Accompanist for Queensland Conservatorium Chorus. Aleta is an experienced guest presenter in musicianship and choral conducting for KMEIA, ASME and ANCA.



Tess Laird

Tess Laird has been a music specialist for 24 years and holds a Masters in Music Studies from UQ.
